□ Elimination of Dog Mediated Rabies
Support education globally through rabies
education programs on bite prevention,
expanding dog rabies vaccination coverage to
stop transmission, improving access to post
exposure prophylaxis and by lobbying
governments to provide the funds to achieve

### ☐ Registration of Old Landfills

- Global Dental Relief | An organization provides free dental care to children around the world through volunteers. Club members bring in new toothbrushes to monthly meetings and donations are made to the organization each year. Collection box was placed at local Extension Office, and donations are ongoing.
- **Lions Club Eyeglasses Program** | Lions collect and distribute used eyeglasses to people in need. A collection box was place at the local Extension Office and donations are ongoing.
- Paintsville Lake Activity, Nature, and Edible Trail (P.L.A.N.E.T.) | A team of people, including Johnson County Extension Homemakers, the Army Corp of Engineers, Fish and Wildlife, and Scouts Troupe Leaders have cleared an area to help recreate an area that offers a unique environmental experience for community members. Local Family Consumer Sciences Agent helped find funding to purchase tools, trees, berry bushes, and grape vines, all so visitors will be able to pick and enjoy fruit and all the other edibles. Master Gardeners have hosted classes about edible greens, native plants, and other interesting topics. This area offers beautiful hiking trails, and a few pollinator gardens. Local Homemakers are constantly volunteering their time and skillsets help tend to the land and to raise funds to purchase more tools and plants.
- **EcoBricks** | Making and Learning The objective of this project is to provide families with a way of responsibly recycling plastics in order to improve our environmental footprint by re-purposing our waste and increasing clean, green spaces to enrich our communities.

### **ECOBRICK BUILD UPDATE**

### Location: Leyte, Philippines

The 2019 – 2021 KEHA International Program of Work, is about educating and creating awareness of EcoBricking. An EcoBrick is a plastic bottle packed to a set density with used, cleaned, and dried plastic to achieve a building block that can be used over and over again.

When plastics are littered, burned, or dumped, they contaminate the ecosystems that sustain us and our fellow species. EcoBricking is a deep solution for plastic. When we save, segregate and pack plastics into bottles, we can make building blocks that can be reused over and over again.

# Today, KEHA has an EcoBrick Build happening in the Philippines and it is 80% complete! This building will serve as a central meeting place for the barangay (village).
