- Club members participated in the dog bed project for the animal shelter. Others made home improvements, recycled, landscaping, and donated to flood relief efforts.
- The 4-H Mothers Club held a yard sale where they raised \$1400.00 for the organizations they help within the community of Jessamine County. The money funded meals and clothing donated to the Homeless Shelter. The club also donates items to Rose Terrace Lodge and Thompson Hood Veterarns Home.
- Some members had vegetable gardens and shared with neighbors, canning tomatoes, green beans, freezing corn, making loaves of bread from garden zucchini and shared.
