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Purchase Area Annual Report

Greetings from the Purchase Area. Our area is made up of eight (8) counties – Ballard, Calloway, Carlisle, Fulton, Graves Hickman, Marshall, and McCracken.

- 1. Fundraisers for Annual Charitable giving and community outreach.
- 2. Total of 116 lap quilts were made for Mercy Health Hospice.
- 3. Provided scholarships to high school seniors.
- 4. Donated to local food backs and blessings boxes.
- 5. Sent cards to Veterans out of country and to nursing homes throughout the year.
- 6. Working with 4-H on sewing classes and teaching the art of sewing.
- 7. Contributed shirts for county 4-H competitions.
- 8. Supported 4-H camp.
- 9. Was in charge of displaying and Quilt Squares silent auction at the KEHA State meeting.
- 10. Back packs and mats made out of plastic bags donated.
- 11. Fed tornado victims and workers.
- 12. Contributed decorative flags at courthouse to be displayed on holiday occasions.
- 13. County fairs with exhibits and recognized with ribbons.
- 14. Established day and night crafts.
- 15. Donated to Angels Trees at Christmas.
- 16. Caps and scarves collected and donated.
- 17. Donated coats that were collected.
- 18. 100% contributing to Ovarian Cancer.
- 19. Assisted in blood drives.
- 20. Assisted with Back to School Bash.
- 21. A two-day seminar on Scrapbooking.
- 22. For Cultural Arts Program, there was a "Swedish Weaving" workshop.
- 23. Discussed management and safety program of work, presented safety escape routes and location of the tornado shelter.
- 24. "How to Avoid Scams" meeting. Lori Farris from the Governor's office gave a program highlighting seams and how to avoid them.
- 25. Hosted a Taste of Africa International Event with Nigerian native Ngomom Gar sampled cuisine, learned about life in Nigeria, donated registration funds to international charity.
- 26. Hosted Annual Arbor Day Celebration. Planted a white oak tree and assisted with distribution of 100 white oak seedlings.
- 27. First Aid Kits were purchased to distribute to those who had been affected by the December 10 tornados. Those are being distributed through the "Welcome Home" project.
- 28. We received the KEHA grant to establish the "Welcome Home" project. On December 10, 2021, a tornado ravaged Western Kentucky, including our hometown of Mayfield. GCEH are partnering with Bread of Life and Homes & Hope for Kentucky to provide a meal for those who would move into the homes the two groups are providing. Club members are cooking a Chicken & Dressing casserole, along with a pan of brownies, to take to the residents. So far, we have had two cooking sessions for the casseroles and the brownies. We freeze them so they are ready when a family moves into their new home. We have taken meals to nine families out of the 30 expected homes we will serve. We also distribute First Aids kits the GCEH homemakers purchased. Several

counties donated quilts to the Graves County Extension to distribute to families in need. We have also taken quilts with us to the families if they need one. We hope the families have benefited from this program, but one unexpected outcome has been the camaraderie that has been established between the three GCEH clubs. The cooking sessions have been filled with great smells, laughter, and much conversation. We are just glad that we can "Welcome Home" our community members into their new ways of life.

Pennyrile Area Report 2022-2023

<u>Caldwell County-Individual clubs in Caldwell County donated to the Ovarian Cancer fund, the Hope and Cope family resource centers, Project Graduation, Feeding God's Children backpack program, and worked with 4-H youth. In January 2023, the Caldwell County Homemakers hosted the Souper Bowl of Caring and collected over 300 non-perishable food items for a local food pantry.</u>

Crittenden County – July 2022- Had a reception for retiring agent, Janeen. Started Big Blue Book Club, and held county fair meetings. In August, worked the County Fair, started a cooking club, and prepared for the year and attended garden club meetings with Dee. In September, started the new year and had bread and candy sales at festival for women. October had proclamation with Judge and attended extra offered classes, and participated in Twight Walk. November continued Quilt Club, Hooks and Needles, and Cooking Clubs as required meetings. In December, Christmas Trees were decorated as an annual project, Christmas in Marion, and club Christmas parties. In January, PACS program was worked with. In February, all projects continued and preparation for the Area Annual meeting started. A reception for the new agent was given and International meeting on Ireland was attended. Passport Crew attended lots of points of interest in Kentucky. Several homemakers attended the State KEHA meeting. We worked on ways to increase membership at all meetings.

<u>Hopkins County-</u>Hopkins County homemakers sponsored several different events including bringing back a college scholarship for a Hopkins County resident. The group sponsored an award at the Hopkins County Fair. Homemakers purchased two stone benches displayed on the Mahr Park walking track.

Lyon County- This year we added two new projects to our schedule. "Quilts for Courage" will be an ongoing endeavor. Our sewing group leads this program with the help of many homemakers. We've presented four and will present 15 at our annual meeting on August 31. These quilts were presented to Veterans that are full time residents of Lyon County. Our next new program is helping in various ways with the Sheriff's Boys & Girls Ranch located in Lyon County. The campers were taught how to properly care for and treat horses. Donations were accepted for watermelons as a meal treat. Another fun activity for the campers provided by the homemakers, was a program "Entertaining Little Ones". Campers responded to this program well and had a fun time.

Muhlenberg County- Muhlenberg County has 5 clubs that meet regularly. Muhlenberg raised money for various organizations throughout the year. These included Penguin Plunge program to raise funds for back packs, National Child Safety Council, Coins for Change, Beans Supper, Western State Hospital, Outwood, and \$4200 was donated to the Ovarian Cancer Fund. A scholarship of \$500 was given to a high school student. Gloves, hats and scarfs were donated to elementary students and clothing items for preschoolers. Worked with 4-H students collecting items for Birthday boxes for children in the backpack program. Homemakers had 2 identity theft classes. 5 members went to the state meeting in May. Some groups have helped seniors do taxes, deliver food to the homeless and helped various churches with food drives. Homemakers have various group for a number of different activities including a library/book club, 2 just for fun clubs, encouraging new members. We have developed a "Join Homemakers" brochure that has all the clubs listed with their meeting times. We are proud that we have a new FCS Agent, Alex Kelly.

Todd County-Todd County Homemakers hosted a Homemaker Fall Food and Fashion Show. The show featured fall fashions and decorations from local businesses as well as food demonstrations given by Todd County Homemaker members. 4-H'ers worked as servers for the event. The show raised awareness of the local businesses and the different types of clothing and decorations they offer. It was also a good marketing tool for homemakers. Also, \$501 was raised for our scholarship fund during the event. Homemakers also raised \$889.00 for the scholarship fund at our annual meeting in December and donated a \$1000.00 scholarship to an Austin Peay student attending culinary school. Also, at the annual meeting in December, officers were elected and members enjoyed hand-on demonstration on the art of bow-tying. Todd County extension moved into their new office at 240 Pond River Road, Elkton in May. Homemakers held an Ice Cream Social to "shower" the new office with items for the kitchen. In addition, the council generously donated 4 serving carts for the new kitchen and many members made individual donations to the Extension Legacy fund.

GREEN RIVER AREA PRESIDENT REPORT 2022 – 2023

This past year all of our counties have been extremely busy with many different activities to promote our Homemaker Clubs. Out of the GRAH, 6 of those counties have a FCS Agent. We have one county, Webster County, that doesn't have any homemaker clubs but Natalie Green, the FCS Agent, is working to remedy that.

Over the past year the GRAH had a total of 38,670 volunteer hours with a monetary value of \$960,177. As the president I am extremely proud of this accomplishment and encourage all of the homemakers to continue to keep up with their hours.

McLean County, our smallest county, for the first time won a 1st place award at the state meeting in May for donating the largest amount of money to Ovarian Cancer Research. The homemakers were busy helping a local resident when she lost her home to fire, working with the AG Fair board to get ready for the annual fair, they teamed up with the local Quilt Guild to have a Quilt show, and worked hard to get ready for the Annual GRAH meeting to be held in September.

Hancock County was awarded a grant at the State meeting in May to promote one of their wonderful ideas. Just to mention a few: taught sewing classes, made fidget mats, made peasant dresses for a Haitian Missionary, made and donated quilts to veterans and to a orphanage in Nicholsville, KY.

Union County who have three clubs in the county with 33 members, may be small but they are strong in their community and state. They donate to the Ovarian Cancer Fund, the World's Greatest Baby Shower, Coins for Change and Camp Courageous. Three of their Happy Day Club members are Master Farm Homemakers.

Daviess County has donated to many community and state organizations. Some of these are, Change for Life Change, Mary Kendall Home, Goodfellows Club, Camp Courageous, Whitesville Historical Center, Maceo community Garden, and many others. They have taught baking classes, cake decorating, made quilts and aprons.

Ohio County participated during their AG Days, donated 55 fidget blankets to resthomes, donated 12 dozen cookies for the Christmas Walk, donated 20 gift baskets to home bound seniors, and donated 40 towels to Camp Courageous.

Henderson County had members to attend the 2022 NVON Conference in Evansville, IN. They participated in the following events: World Food Day, Coins for Change, snacks for 4-H camp, Taste of Homemakers, and putting together backpacks for Henderson County schools. Henderson County is, "Letting their Light Shine Bright" in the county and state.

With new clubs formed to raising funds, each and every county has been busy promoting KEHA.

I have been extremely blessed and excited to be the Green River Area President for the 2022-2023 year and look forward to the next two years and seeing what our area can accomplish.





Northeast Area Homemakers 2022-2023 Annual Report

The Northeast Area consists of nine counties that have an active Extension Homemaker program. The counties are hidden in the beautiful Appalachian Mountains and include Greenup, Carter, Boyd, Lawrence, Johnson, Martin, Magoffin, Floyd and Pike, some of which border the Big Sandy River to the east. As some Areas may send their greetings, in the Northeast we simply say "Howdy" or "Hello" to our fellow homemakers across the state.

As I think about the 2022-2023 theme "We've Got You Covered" I came to realize, after reading the various reports from each of the counties, that our 788 homemakers have the three main aspects of Extension Homemakers covered- Leadership, Learning, and Volunteering.
