GRAH had our first council meeting of the year in September. We made plans for the new calendar year and looked forward to our annual meeting in October. At the meeting, Karen Hill mentioned the State 2020 Census Quilt was now on display, and we looked forward to seeing it at our KEHA State meeting in the Spring.

The GRAH was honored to have had 3 members chosen to attend the Leadership Academy planned for March at Blue Lick Battlefield State Park.

Our annual meeting, with 71 in attendance, was held in Henderson County. The theme of the meeting was "All American Homemaker," and we collected \$550.00 from sales of raffle tickets for The Ovarian Cancer Fund.

By March, COVID-19 had become a reality in our area and all over the country. Many activities, meetings, and fund raisers were canceled due our inability to meet. Although we couldn't have actual meetings, many homemakers were busy at home with charitable projects. Members began to make masks for hospitals, nursing homes, and family and friends because of the shortage of manufactured protective personal equipment. After that crisis was covered, and at the request of Kentucky's First Lady Britainy Beshear and the Lt. Governor Jacqueline Coleman, we began to make masks for Kentucky Schools in preparation for the beginning of the school year.

COVID-19 was not finished interrupting our agendas. By the end of 2019-2020, when we started our 2020-2021 year, the monster was still around. Let's see what is ahead for KEHA!

DAVIESS COUNTY HOMEMAKERS

2019-2020 REPORT

Seven clubs of Daviess County Homemakers totaled 106 members. Five of the seven clubs prepared details of their goals reached. All met their goals plus additional support of serving as representatives on Council, attending lesson training sessions, and, despite the Covid-19 pandemic, all met 6 sessions to give emotional support to members/spouses who have been affected in some way from health or physical conditions.

The outreach to community through Ovarian Cancer Research was 100%. Multiple skills plus items reached Camp for Courageous Kids at Scottsville, and cards/notes and clothing met needy veterans' essentials. The purchased note cards advertising homemakers' connections to Barn Quilt Trails publicized Daviess County Homemakers with proceeds going to our scholarship fund. We provided assistance to the LEAP program for home-schooled kids. Many non-profit organizations were supported on monthly donations: Buddy Bags, Backpack ministry of lunches, Goodfellows, children's books to Daviess County Jail, Hayden Girls Home, Boulware Center, Help office, Care Net, Fresh Start, and Humane Society built up neighbors' requests for help throughout our short year.

Great response was received to the International project in February plus donation of \$50.00 to the "Water for All" project.

We recycled and re-purposed much like the Suffragettes did who prepared our communities to vote one hundred years ago!

Daviess County women proudly served the schools, church ministries, food banks, and special courageous kids with money, foods, clothing (capes, masks, aprons, & pillowcases) and thousands (8,956.5) of volunteer hours.

We continue donating items to a local nursing home for bingo prizes and supporting the culinary department at the local high school by donating kitchen gadgets and kitchen tools, 4-H, World Food with donations to the local pantries, and knitting and crocheting items.

Union County Homemakers Presidents Report

2019-2020

Union County Homemakers have been very busy throughout the year of 2019-2020. The homemaker groups have volunteered in several Extension Service endeavors as well as in their own programs, civic and community groups.

They started out with an energy surpassing no other years as they are all dedicated and committed members. Happy Day Homemakers hosted the luncheon for the annual Distinguished Young Women's event. The event held at the Union County Extension office was for the judges. They served a Surfer Salad, which was a recipe of a member who passed away in 2019.

In November the Union County Homemakers, consisting of Happy Day, Morganfield Young and Uniontown Club, participated at the Christmas Open House at the library to promote extension homemakers. There were 120 blended spice samples from the lesson "Spice It Up." Each visitor at the booth received a sample bottle and the lesson information to make their own spice blends. There were 122 who registered for the door prize of a one year mailbox membership and a three-spice jar sample from the lesson.

In December, Happy Day Homemakers conducted a sing-a-long and served ice cream, cookies and punch to residents of Breckinridge Place. In December each of the clubs remember their deceased members and make donations to Ben's Place, an adult day care.

In March the coronavirus hit and caused the world to stop. Members were quarantined and meetings were canceled for several months. During this time homemakers kept busy with at home projects. One member learned how to crochet through the YouTube channel. A few more took advantage of lessons they had learned including the lesson on birds. Several members put out feeding stations, bird baths and started learning about the local birds and watching them. Other members built raised container beds and planted a hummingbird and butterfly mix of zinnias, and other blooming flowers, to attract butterflies, hummingbirds and bees. There were a couple of members who discovered caterpillars, chrysalises and watched them evolve into monarchs and black swallowtail butterflies.

While some members enjoyed the outdoors through flowers, birds and butterflies, there were many more who spent time in their vegetable gardens and reaping what they sowed. There were close to 400 quarts and nearly 150 pints of produce preserved. There were also many ears of corn frozen on the cobs.

While some members were sowing and reaping, others were sewing and ripping! There were almost 500 masks sewn by several members to distribute to hospitals, medical teams, and their patients.

Along with the masks county members gathered and filled gift bags with snacks, mini notebooks, pens and items from the extension office and donated them as thank you gifts to 100 first responders.

Members not only preserved food for their families and sewed and made crafts for themselves, they also took advantage of the local farmer's market held every Saturday during the summer. They had fresh vegetables as well as soup bowl cozies for sale.

Each year around Mother's Day the Union County Homemakers would serve hot tea and cookies to the residents at Breckinridge Place in Morganfield. The variety of teas would be served in real tea cups and saucers with homemade cookies. This year the annual Tea wasn't possible so members wrote special thinking of you notes for each patient and the staff of Breckinridge handed them out.

Our members are number one in our hearts when it comes to volunteering. We have members who are regular volunteers at the local hospital, nursing homes, in their churches and for their families. Of course this year's numbers were quite different in past volunteer hours, but our members are so ready to get back into their communities to serve.

Hopefully the pandemic and the coronavirus will be over soon and the homemaker clubs in Union County can get back to serving within their communities.
