COINS FOR CHANGE

Since 1936, Kentucky Extension Homemakers have been a member of the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW). ACWW is a non-political, non-sectarian international organization involving more than 6.5 million members of women's organizations and societies in more than 70 countries around the world. The organization works to improve standards of living for women and their families through a wide variety of world projects. Their Pennies for Friendship program assists in funding these projects, and half of the funds collected each year through KEHA's Coins for Change program are forwarded to ACWW. This year KEHA has collected \$7,363.04 and \$3,681.52 of that was sent to ACWW.

KEHA CLEAN WATER & SANITATION

The KEHA Clean Water Project has been very successful and beneficial to a developing country like the Philippines, which has unsafe drinking water. Only a small population in the Philippines can afford municipal water and the majority of the population relies on water pumps, which are untreated. In rural areas, where water pumps are nonexistent and their main source of water being spring water and rivers, are often contaminated from the livestock run off etc. KEHA distributes water filters to those families who cannot afford to buy bottled water. We hope to continue this project and to be able to reach more families that desperately need potable drinking water. We have started to receive requests from families who have heard about our Clean Water & Sanitation Project through satisfied families who continue to spread the good word of how much better they feel since KEHA provided them with a water filter. We have reports that the overall health for those families who received a water filter, have dramatically change to positive. One household in the rural area of Leyte, Philippines sent us a picture in October 2019 of her family's water filter arrangement and another picture of the results from backwashing her filter before bedtime. She said she always catches the backwashed water in a jar to remind herself of how dirty the water they've been drinking really is. This year, KEHA raised \$602.26 for the Clean Water & Sanitation Fund.

KENTUCKY ACADEMY

More than 10 years ago, KEHA initiated work in support of the Kentucky Academy kindergarten in the village of Adjeikrom in Ghana. Over the years, KEHA's support provided infrastructure updates for the kindergarten, curriculum resources, construction of a dining pavilion, support for a sewing cooperative, and more. In recent years, the focus has been construction of a library for the village. As of June 2019, donations are still needed help buy computers and books, light fixtures, furniture, washroom fittings. Please send all donations to our State Treasurer. This year, KEHA has collected \$1,394.33 to help support the Academy.

ECOBRICK PROJECT

When plastics are littered, burned or dumped, they contaminate the ecosystems that sustain us and our fellow species. Ecobricking is a deep solution for plastic. When we save, segregate and pack plastics into bottles, we can make building blocks that can be reused over and over again. Today, we have two EcoBrick builds in the works. One located in the Philippines and another located in Johnson County, Kentucky. More updates to come!
